Myers' Musings March 2025 The Liturgical Season of Lent

Dear church family,

Several years ago, a schoolteacher was assigned to visit children in a large city hospital. She received a phone call – seemingly a routine request to go visit a child. The teacher said, "we're studying nouns and adverbs in his class now. I'd be grateful if you could help him with his homework, so he doesn't fall too far behind the others.

It wasn't until the visiting teacher got outside the boy's room that she realized she was in the hospital's burn unit. No one had prepared her to find a young boy horribly burned and in great pain. She felt that she couldn't just turn around and walk out, so she awkwardly stammered, "I'm the hospital teacher, and your schoolteacher sent me to help you with nouns and adverbs." The boy was in such pain he barely responded. She stumbled through his English lesson, ashamed at putting him through such a senseless exercise while he was in such great pain and suffering. The next morning the nurse on the burn unit asked her, "What did you do to that boy? Before she could finish a profusion of apologies, the nurse interrupted her: "You don't understand. We've been very worried about him. But ever since you were here

yesterday, his whole attitude has changed. He's fighting back, responding to treatment – it's as though he's decided to live!" The boy later explained that he had completely given up hope until he saw that teacher come into his room. It all changed when he came to a simple realization. With joyful tears, he expressed it this way: "They wouldn't send a teacher to work on nouns and adverbs with a dying boy, would they?"

I think of this story every Lent. It's harder for me to muster hope during Lent than at any other time of the year. The very nature of the season of Lent calls us to look closely at our own weaknesses and sins. It's a time when I look back over the past year and count my losses.

When I seem to see around me is woundedness and pain, this story invites me to celebrate the gift of life! It shows me again that on the other side of pain is resurrection. It reminds me of what is possible when there is hope.

May God's Grace and Peace be with you!

PASTORAL SEARCH COMMITTEE

The UCC asks pastoral search committees and their congregations to make FIVE COMMITMENTS.

A Faith Commitment . . . we suspect you know what this means!

A Time Commitment . . . we remember Dave's sermon on "God's Time".

A Commitment to Openness . . . we pledge a genuine consideration of all candidates.

A Commitment to Consensus . . . we discuss concerns and listen

intentionally to what each member says. When we decide on a candidate to present to the church, we do not simply vote with a majority making the decision. We all have to agree as one body that this candidate will or will not be presented to the church. That said, no one committee member has veto power; instead, we agree to work through concerns as best as we can.

A Commitment to Confidentiality . . . we know you want to know where we are in the process, especially if we are getting close to finding a settled minister. Please remember what candidates expect from us and recognize that we could lose someone if we breach their trust in us. Many who currently serve congregations have not said that they are looking for a new position. Here's what the conference guidelines say about this last commitment.

"Committee members must not talk about the content of their work. That is to say, the sharing of names of individuals under consideration is a serious breach of process. Even to speak in generalities about location or experience or gender can risk folk guessing who the committee is considering.

The congregation must be kept informed at every step of the process. Sharing where the Search Committee is in the process is critical. However, until a final candidate is presented, all conversation about any candidate is closely guarded."

So, where are we now? We are updating the church profile and working with the conference's associate conference minister, John Fiscus, to improve the interview questions we will pose to any new candidates that come our way. We have faith that God will send the right person to us at the right time. Meanwhile, we are grateful to Rev. Dave Myers for all that he does!

Worship themes and Sermons for March 2025 The Liturgical Season of Lent

March 2:

Transfiguration Sunday.

Communion: Sermon: "Just Trying to Get Away From It All" based

on Exodus 34:29 – 35 and Luke 9:28 – 36. The story of the Transfiguration of Jesus happened on a mountain in front of Peter, James and John. We are told that Moses and Elijah also made an appearance, and afterward they disappeared a cloud "overtook them . . . and a voice came out of the cloud said: "This is My Son, the Chosen; listen to Him!" Sometimes I wish things could be made so clear to me, but I like Peter, James and John tried their best.

March 5:

Ash Wednesday Service. 7:00 pm.

A quiet contemplative service using Taizé Music. Ashes will be imposed for those who so wish.

March 9:

First Sunday of Lent.

Sermon: "Hens and Brooding" based on Luke 13:31 – 35. The scene is Jesus coming to Jerusalem and he is outside the walls on the hillside and weeping over the city because they have lost sight of the faith and turned the most Holy Day into a marketplace. His prayer: "Jerusalem, Jerusalem, How I have want to gather you under my arms like a mother hen gathers her chicks, "but you were not willing." Do we ever consider that instead of God not answering our prayers, we might need to look at ourselves and see if we are willing to listen to God?

Reminder: Set clocks ahead one hour on Saturday evening.

March 16:

Sermon: "Prayer When Bad Things Happen" based on Luke 13:1 – 5 and Luke 18:1 – 8. We all have had bad, tragic things happen to us at some point in our lives. How do we pray, especially when bad things happen? Today's scriptures suggest that prayer is not so much an attempt to influence God, much less to get God to change God's mind; rather it is an act of opening oneself to God Who is already present.

March 23:

Sermon: "A Little Help from My Friends" based on Isaiah 43:18 – 25 and Mark 2:1 – 12. Mrs. Thelma Scott was my 3rd grade Sunday School teacher in Orono, Maine. One of my favorite stories she taught us was Jesus healing the paralytic man who had been lowered through the roof, because the crowd was so big it wouldn't allow him to get close otherwise. A question: are we the crowd that

keeps people from Jesus, or the four friends that helped the paralytic get to Jesus to be healed?

March 30:

Sermon: "Sweeping Away the Past" based on Isaiah 43:16 - 21 and Philippians 3:4b - 14. Isaiah and Paul both had transformations - drastic transformations! They wanted to move on from their past beliefs. People of deep faith recognize that there are times when God's people need to change course. Are we at one of those times?

April 6: 5th Sunday of Lent.

Communion. Sermon: "Managing God" based on John 11:1-45 (the story of Lazarus being raised from the dead). The remarkable thing about this story is how upset Lazarus' sister Martha and Mary were angry at Jesus for allowing Lazarus to die. They were trying to "manage Jesus." But our time is not always God's time. As Jesus told them, "this was done for the glory of God."
